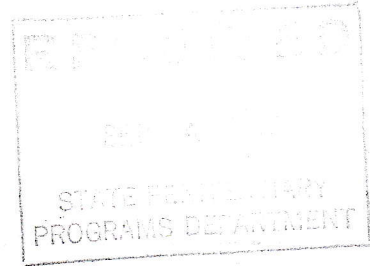

Mr. Enders:

Please, this is not a grievance, but a request asking for the chance to correct a mistake.

On February 26, 1979, law enforcement officials from Minnesota called on me claiming they had information that I knew something about the murder of a young child near Wolf Lake, Minnesota, which crime was perpetrated on the evening of April 3, 1976.

For reasons I felt were valid I refused to help. However, I recognize that was a terrible mistake, and as great an act of injustice as what I preach against.

If you would be so kind, please notify the proper officials to send me an address where I can mail the information they requested. Too, I want those officials to know that another citizen has learned the hard way, that silence does not afford protection for oneself or family against those who have no regard for human life.

Mr. Enders, I don't even need all the fingers of one hand to count my friends, and can not afford losing what I have. However, one of those friends is involved, at least by association, with those people who are involved in a crime that cannot be ignored.

Please advise our own officials that I know the identity of the person who received money to arrange for the contract murder on Holly Diny, and a witness who was probably party to the conspiracy, and saw the money change hands.

No, I'm not seeking any favors in return. I intend to win my own case, and cannot do so until I have made certain that I have not denied justice to another, or that I'm responsible for injustice. This will clear the books, and I can look forward

of those responsible for my false imprisonment.
